On Jan. 26, Pender County Tourism met with Surf City officials in our ongoing pursuit of collaboration.

The executive committee of the **North Carolina Beach Inlet and Waterway Association** met, followed by the general quarterly board of directors meeting. In the meeting board members expressed the desire for a newsletter. We met with Executive Director Kathleen Riely to discuss production of a newsletter.

We met virtually with our web master, **BlueTone Media**, for an annual update of their service.

We met with the county manager, both assistant managers, and finance to review our **Fiscal Year** 21/22 Financial Plan.

We continue our collaboration with **Cape Fear Community Colleg**e regarding their September event in Burgaw.

We celebrated **Genesis Block** grants virtually. The Newkirks presented grants to minority-owned businesses, including Pender County businesses.

We continue to work with Smithfield, Burgaw, health care works, and first responders for the **Hometown Heroes Juncheon on Feb. 10.**

We met with **JM's On The Water** and shared information with them about the tourism office. They are located in the former Cheri's restaurant in Surf City.

We met with the new executive director at the **Greater Topsail Area Chamber** to discuss projects and events.

We attended a Duke University workshop on the **Blue Economy**.

We are working with the North Carolina Beach Inlet and Waterway Association in the planning of their **spring conference**.

Our staff received a late proof of our **visitor guide** and worked to get the final proof to the publisher. The guide has been printed and will be delivered this afternoon (Feb. 5).

We attended, virtually, both the **commissioners' meeting and the Surf City council meeting** (to keep apprised of the paid parking issue).

We are pleased to report filming continues in Burgaw, the Town Hollywood Loves.

UTILITY OPERATIONS

PENDER COUNTY UTILITIES (PCU) & WATER DISTRICTS:

The Kiwanis Park well is now operational. The final work on the Annex well has begun for its permanent facilities construction, so that well is temporarily out-of-service until all the work is completed. We have not been operating the Annex well since Christmas due to prep for final construction and lower demand. Staff has been working on some hydraulic issues within the system along and near Sloop Point Loop Road to assist with the operation of the new Kiwanis Park well.

PCU restarted water use from the Town of Wallace on January 25th. We had only been using Wallace water sporadically since the end of the summer due to lower demands and obligations to use scheduled quantities of raw water from LCFWASA. We plan to continue using Wallace water as needed to benefit the overall system, with a goal to reach our contracted annual minimum purchase volume.

The physical connections to the existing Maple Hill water system were completed this week on NC 50 and Wooten Road for our interconnections project with ONWASA. Contractors inserted a new valve on the end of the existing water main on NC 50, and we did a temporary shutdown on Wooten Road to tie into that water main. Remaining work is to complete the valve vaults and backflow preventer enclosures, and final clean-up.

We currently have 3 personnel vacancies at PCU. We completed interviews this week for the Water/Sewer Maintenance Technician position and hope to make an offer soon. We are scheduling interviews for the 2 Utility Clerk vacancies (55 applicants).

Staff work and status updates since last report:

- Completed pressure test on domestic line and witnessed chlorination at Southside Commons and on Wooten Road in Maple Hill.
- Four taps installed and repaired service. One service leak repaired.
- · Water flushing at Arden Drive, Wooten Road, and John Pickett Road.
- 246 locate requests fulfilled in the last two weeks.
- Inspected Southside Commons second water main tie-in on Forest Sound Road.

- Met with two contractors for quote on 2" water line from Salters Haven to Factory Road. We are working on a third quote, and hope to begin work this month.
- Multiple meetings and contact with contractor for the ONWASA interconnection at Maple Hill on Hwy 50 and Wooten Road.
- Met with Carolina Water Service about their valve configurations around Kiwanis Park.
- Planned and implemented System Pressure Advisory in Maple Hill for area affected by ONWASA tie-in work.
- Met with developer for last phase of Whitebridge development.
- Met with T&H Construction for pre-construction meeting in Wyndwater.
- Still using automatic flush valve on Belt Road to address water quality concerns on dead-end line.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Yearly calibrations on all flow meters are complete. We are continuing to prepare for the annual draining and cleaning of the sedimentation basins, flocculators and rapid mix chambers.

Lauren (Lab Technician) completed Physical/Chemical Grade 1 School and Erin (new Operator) completed C-Surface Operator School. Both schools were held virtually.

After many jar tests and thorough backwashing of the filters to remove the inadequate Ferric Sulfate,

the plant is back to normal operations. The entire staff worked hard to ensure that the plant always remained in compliance.

Production numbers for January: 42.6 million gallons for an average of 1.37 MGD

PCP WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT - MKKAES (Melinda K. Knoezer Adaptive Ecosystem)

We have had some challenges since our last update, but we have kept the plant in compliance. Some of the work recently accomplished includes:

- Replaced our chemical feed pump.
- · Replaced chemical feed lines.
- · Rebuilt UV unit #2.
- · Painted inside Conex box.
- Finished putting floor down in Conex box.
- · Cut plants back in greenhouse.
- · Changed outside laboratory for more reliability.

SOLID WASTE

The Transfer Station scale house building had a small issue with our septic system which was recently addressed with the help of the Facilities department. We are creating about 80 tickets daily for disposal records. Waiting time at scales is about 6 minutes IN and 6 minutes OUT.

Our scale house credit card machine has not been working since Wednesday morning. Staff has worked with the merchant company and our IT department to try to get it operational again. As of Friday morning, it still was not working. IT staff is scheduled to replace some hardware on Friday to get it working again. We are not able to charge for disposal at this time, so we have been taking customers' information with the fee amounts and will be calling them for payment once the credit card machine is fixed.
