### Pender tourism board to launch Black history trail app on Juneteenth

The contributions and triumphs of Black people are deeply rooted in Pender County, and a new project aims to show that heritage.

Work on the Pender County African American Heritage Trail is underway. The purpose of the project from the Pender County Tourism Department is to highlight

Black history in the area. Karen Malloy, who serves on the tourism board, believes it's a way to educate Pender students and adults.

"When you find out there's so much local history, to me, that's even more important and exciting," Malloy said. It will include prominent leaders, Gullah

hee culture, and historic sites such as the Canetuck Rosenwald School, which

# Teachers to be among best-paid in the state

Board of Commissioners boosting its average educator supplements

Some of North Carolina's best and brightest teachers could soon head to New Hanover County.

The county's Board of Commissioners approved its budget last week, more than doubling average teacher supplements from the county. That makes New Harsover County teachers among the most wellpaid in the state. New Hanover County was previously ranked 27th in the state for teacher supplements.

"We owe it to future generations for our kids to have the best education possible," Board of Commis-sioners Chair Asila Olson-Boseman said. "I think we do that by attracting and keeping the best teachers possible."

Teacher supplements from the county will now be an average of \$9,000, up more than double the current average of \$4,103.

Because of reevaluations that showed growth in property values, the county's newly approved budget allowed the commissioners to lower property taxes while still increasing revenue into their general fund,

which will fund the pay raise for teachers.

The board approved that budget in a 3-2 vote, with Olson-Boseman and commissioners Jonathan Barfield Jr. and Bill Rivenbark voting in favor. Vice chair Deb Hays and commissioner Rob Zapple voted against it.

Olson-Boseman said she hoped that would allow teachers to sustain themselves through their teaching salary, rather than taking second jobs in addition to working in the schools, especially after going to college to get a degree in education.

"I just don't think that teachers have been appreciated like they should have been," she said. "They should be paid like doctors and lawyers and the best I could do as a commissioner is get their suppliement to

- Received Annual inspection from Public Water Supply with favorable comments. Will be back in 90 days to review increase in Bac T testing site additions and several plan modifications.
- · Automatic flush valve on daily flush on Camden Ct.
- · Automatic flush valve installed on Michigan Avenue.
- Rigorous flushing in distribution system in Wyndwater and surrounding areas due to numerous colored water complaints. We found several system valves closed and multiple fire hydrants not active. Remedied these problems and flushed. This had a much-improved result and low complaints to none.
- 3 Taps by staff and two relocated services.
- Five service breaks repaired and three service breaks on customer side of meter reported to customers.
- 270 locates requested and fulfilled in the last two weeks.
- One Meter Reader is still out but returning in early July from FMLA.
- · All monthly reports last month completed and submitted.
