- Started using Sea Quest brand orthophosphate at wells to help with iron.
- Installed two new chemical feed pumps at Sloop Point booster to increase chlorine disinfectant level.
- Staff fixed water main break at Moore's Landing in Hampstead.
- · 6 after-hours emergency calls with staff response.
- · 4 new water taps completed by staff.
- 25 water meter inspections completed and numerous water meter sets.
- 75 plus work orders completed, meter reading county-wide.
- · 378 locates in last two weeks
- Due to higher water demand, must run at least one Hampstead well during overnight hours, and both wells during the day.
- Extensive water line flushing in the Hampstead area. We are continuing to vary the Topsail water tank level more often to increase disinfectant level.
- 30 Bac-T samples taken. TTHM and HAA5 samples taken.
- · Monthly operating reports completed.
- Checked all sewer lift stations for proper function, tested all high-level floats.

The wastewater plant is running very good right now. All our numbers are well below the limits.

- The contractor returned to finish the soil borings in the yard.
- · We had a state audit on June 28th which went well.
- We did some decanting from the digester (see photo).
- · We had two power outages in the past two weeks from the storms that required nighttime visits.
- We performed a backwash on the Moving Bed Biofilm Reactor (MBBR).

SOLID WASTE

- The Transfer Station scale house is operating well.
- Waiting time at scales is about 3 minutes in and 4 minutes out.
- New flooring for the scale house has been installed and looks great (see photos).
- · July 4th holiday scale traffic was extremely slow.


Plant Operator Erin has passed the B-Surface certification exam on her first try. Staff from both plants repaired the motor and limit switches on one of the shop's garage bay doors.

We work in agriculture, horticulture, natural resources and the environment (storm water, erosion, wetlands restoration, water quality, etc.) and 4-H Youth Development teaching civic leadership and community development.

Consumer Horticulture - Tiffanee Boone

- · Please help us celebrate Tiffanee's 19 years of service with NC Cooperative Extension (July 1). Call her and say Congratulations!
- · Continuing to put gardening information on the Master Gardener Facebook page.
- · Answered 42 phone calls, text messages, email, and Facebook messenger questions about gardening and soils.
- · Completed FEMA ICS 100 & 200 certifications for hurricane preparedness.
- Participated in NCSU's Plants, Pests, and Pathogens in-service Zoom training for updates about plant diseases and insect pressures. **Spotted Lanternfly** is the latest invasive pest found in North Carolina. It has been found in Surrey County, north of Winston-Salem, but residents of Pender County need to know what this pest looks like and call the Cooperative Extension office if you this insect is here. 
